# Local Content and Service Report TO THE COMMUNITY



Northern California Public Media (NorCal) enhances connections with the community by listening, understanding, and fostering dialogues throughout the Bay Area as one of the few community-owned and operated media entities serving the region. In 2024, NorCal created and presented over 2,000 top-quality, locally produced stories and programs covering an extensive array of issues important to the Bay Area, including the environment and news reporting, as well as arts and culture.

## LOCAL VALUE

NorCal is enjoyed by 714,000 viewers in the Bay Area community each week through our television channels and 25,000 listeners each week through our Sonoma County radio service. Over 98,000 community members have attended NorCal sponsored events during the year, and over 600,000 people have watched or listened to NorCal programs during 2024 through our online and social media channels.

## LOGAL IMPACT

NorCal Public Media consists of two television stations and one radio station. KRCB TV (Cotati, California) is a PBS member station with three channels of public television service: KRCB PBS, KRCB Create, and NHK World Japan. KPJK TV (San Mateo, California) is an independent educational station with six channels of public television service: KPJK HD, France 24, NHK World Japan, Deutsche Welle, KRCB Radio Live Stream, and FNX First Nations Experience. KRCB FM 104.9 (Rohnert Park, California) is an NPR member station with a primary broadcast on 104.9, but also simulcasts on 91.1 serving the north and west regions of Sonoma County, and on the 90.9 repeater signal serving the City of Santa Rosa, in addition to a KRCB Radio Livestream.

### KEY SERVICES

## 2024

was a year of affirming the importance of our mission as public media journalists serving the Bay Area.

When most of us were young we couldn't imagine a world where our local communities would be receiving more partisan opinion than news reporting; where the end of fact checking would be

celebrated by a large portion of the populace; where the intentional spreading of misinformation would be tolerated; and where local issues of importance would be overtaken by a nationalized culture war. Nevertheless, here we are.

Many people prefer information that aligns with their firmly held beliefs. It is comforting and ego-affirming. Verifiable facts become a secondary concern. Today, journalistic institutions that spend resources on factchecking and verification are at best marginalized and at worst vilified. Professional reporting rarely fits into one ideology or another, instead it uncomfortably challenges all.

The circus sideshow aspect of social media and the current climate of nationalized political tribalism are obstacles to reaching people with good, solid, local reporting. These forces are also contributing to the demise of local media outlets, putting the financial model of commercial media in peril.

#### Enter public media.

NorCal Public Media is adding new local journalists to our daily reporting and bringing you news focused on the most important local issues of our region. National outlets are not going to cover the latest county supervisor meeting, nor will they ask difficult questions to those in power on city councils, school boards, or in the mayor's office. We are your eyes and ears in the halls of power, so you know what decisions are being made about your future.

Our partnership with the *Press Democrat* newspaper resulted in a year-long initiative called "Trust & Democracy" that highlighted these issues. This series of lectures, panel discussions, and film screenings introduced local audiences to some of today's great thinkers on the role of local journalism in society. One of the most memorable evenings was a riveting lecture by *NPR Weekend Edition* Sunday host Ayesha Rascoe, who also participated in a follow-up panel discussion with local journalists and a robust Q&A session with an engaged audience.

Thank you for supporting impactful local reporting with your membership in NorCal Public Media. Together, we will keep the beacon of local journalism lit brightly. We are all beginning to understand what happens when the shadows grow deeper, and the light begins to fade.

#### WOMEN ENVIRONMENTALISTS

AWE: Awesome Women Environmentalists is a documentary series celebrating women addressing climate change and environmental challenges while ensuring parks and open spaces are inclusive to all. Produced by Kelly + Yamamoto Productions and NorCal Public Media, the series shares stories of diverse, inspiring women. Season two highlights Lidia D'Amico, a National Park Service ranger and first-generation Latina American who monitors Alcatraz Island's bird populations, including once-endangered Peregrine Falcons. Also featured is Blanca Hernández, an immigrant from Mexico and the first in her family to attend college. Blanca is Director of Programs & Partnerships for YES! Nature to Neighborhood, a non-profit organization that promotes the transformative benefits of connecting people with nature.

#### LGBTQ+ PERSPECTIVES

From local streets to cities around the world, LGBTQ+ pride is rising. In Oakland, Connect the Bay met Jeffrey Myers, head of the new Lakeshore LGBTQ Cultural District. He hopes the district will foster a community where every Oakland resident can feel safe to exist free and proud. In San Jose, we featured a story about trans county manager Sera Fernando in the annual Pride parade representing Santa Clara County's groundbreaking Office of LGBTQ Affairs. And international stories of people inspired by San Francisco artist Gilbert Baker's original rainbow flag make up a traveling exhibit that has been documented in NorCal's film Flag in the Map: Charting Rainbow Flag Stories.

#### AFRICAN AMERICAN STORIES

At San Jose State's Art Department, Connect the Bay met Caleb Dowdell, a young painter who is bringing the beauty of black faces to light through his art.



His goal is to uplift those around him by creating artwork that inspires and fosters unity and creativity. In East Palo Alto, Millicent Grant works tirelessly as a volunteer assisting her aging neighbors. For decades she has been involved with the senior center there, helping to provide services and much-needed meals to the underserved older population. In one of NorCal's special *Unsung Hero* stories she reminded that "Everybody needs to know that somebody loves them, somebody cares!"

#### LATINO COMMUNITY FOCUS

Latina Coalition of Silicon Valley is a non-profit organization that has been providing Latinas with civic engagement and leadership development skills in Silicon Valley since 1999. Connect the Bay learned they cultivate leadership through a female and Latino/a cultural lens, by educating on issues that affect the community through panels, workshops and events. In Half Moon Bay, Ayudando Latinos a Soñar (Helping Latinos Dream) is a 10-year-old nonprofit known affectionately as ALAS. They provide crucial services to

many in the community, including farmworkers. *Bay Area Bountiful* joined them as they brought lunch to these hard-working people in the field.

#### **NATIVE AMERICAN CULTURE**

Indian Health Center of Santa Clara Valley believes that culture is medicine. Marissa Hemstreet (Cañoncito Band of Navajo) showed Connect the Bay how IHC addresses physical and mental health needs with a uniquely Native American perspective. She told us, "There is true healing in the reclamation of things that were taken from you." Our reports also focused on artist/activist Charlene Eigen-Vasquez (Ohlone) who led the installation of a new exhibit at Saratoga's Montalvo Arts Center. "A Path Forward: Honoring Ohlone Land & Spirit" uses both actual and virtual artwork. Called a living monument, Charlene told us "The idea is to lift up the culture...and just overall have respect for one another."

Public television is great. We need an independent voice in a sea of noise and confusion.

#### **FOOD AND WINE AWARDS**

NorCal Public Media's gala fundraising event had a second successful year, celebrating individuals and organizations that exemplify excellence, innovation, and a commitment to the betterment of our local communities and environment, shining a spotlight on environmental issues and their impact on our communities, and winning support for our Center for Environmental Reporting. In September, the Food & Wine Awards event won the 2024 Public Media Award for Best Community Special Event at the National Educational Telecommunications Association (NETA) conference.

#### NORCAL KIDS AND FAMILIES

PBS Kids made fun and learning happen in 2024! In April at the annual Family Day at the Green Music Center, kids enjoyed a 20-foot-long Sesame Street coloring activity, a PBS Kids photo backdrop, and tablets loaded with PBS Kids games, apps, and their favorite shows. And lots and lots of stickers! In August at the Gravenstein Apple Fair, thousands of kids brought their parents to dance with bubbles and climb hay bales at our outdoor PBS Kids play area. Wild Kratts fans got animal nets and eye scopes for their nature adventures, and Daniel Tiger lovers stopped by for stickers and photos. In November, bilingual PBS Kids materials, including helpful resource materials for parent and teachers, were the highlight of a family sing-along night with the animated film Encanto.

#### TRUST AND DEMOCRACY

In partnership with *The Press Democrat* newspaper, this 3-part series invited the community to join us as we created interactive experiences with expert speakers, writers and filmmakers to give people in our community tools to navigate the complexities of

our information landscape. We heard from author and former AP bureau chief Katherine Corcoran about the dangers faced by journalists trying to bring the truth to light in some societies; from NPR's Ayesha Rascoe about the personal triumphs and pitfalls she faced as she built her career in journalism; and from Academy Award nominee Rick Goldsmith who showed us his film Stripped for Parts: American Journalism on the Brink.

#### YOUTH PODCAST CAMP

The KRCB FM 104.9 Youth Podcast Workshops Series offers a dynamic learning experience for aspiring young creators in podcast production. Featuring "ears on" learning, students explore diverse podcast examples to understand various sounds and styles. The program swiftly transitions to "hands on" sessions, where participants engage with recording equipment and preproduction techniques. Collaboratively, students develop a podcast, focusing on story ideas and soundscapes, while gaining practical field recording experience. The series concludes with a focus on post- production skills,

enabling participants to script and edit their podcasts, thus equipping them with vital tools for future media storytelling.

#### **SONOMA SECRET SANTA**

Starting with a single Giving Tree in 1988, Sonoma County's Secret Santa, a project of the Center for Volunteer and Nonprofit Leadership, has grown to help more than 100 county agencies, schools and nonprofits serving children in need. Staffed by hundreds of dedicated volunteers and sponsored by thousands of local businesses, Secret Santa fills more than 25,000 wishes each year, and NorCal was a proud media sponsor, spreading the word throughout our viewing and listening area in support of holiday giving.





#### **REAL DANGERS OF FENTANYL**

In a series of investigative reports, Northern California Public Media's news team revealed concerning narratives surrounding the opioid crisis in Sonoma County, particularly regarding fentanyl. The Sonoma County District Attorney's Office withdrew a contentious public service announcement depicting a child's death from merely touching fentanyl. Medical experts deemed this portrayal misleading and unfounded. Sonoma County's District Attorney dismissed concerns over the public alarm that was caused. A separate incident involved a deputy requiring Narcan after suspected fentanyl exposure, with experts suggesting anxiety rather than overdose as the cause. Our newsroom exposed increasing misinformation about the dangerous drug fentanyl.

#### **MEASURE J TOWN HALL DEBATE**

KRCB FM 104.9 hosted a full-house town-hall style debate at the Central Santa Rosa Library, focusing on Measure J, a citizen-initiated ballot measure in Sonoma County. Measure J sought to phase out existing

and prohibit future Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO) across Sonoma County. The debate was live-streamed on our website, YouTube, and Facebook, reaching a wide audience and inspiring a follow-up fact-checking initiative from our newsroom, a special radio program and episodes of our *NorCal Ballot Box* podcast. Through this initiative, KRCB reinforced its commitment to informed community dialogue and civic engagement, ensuring that residents were equipped to make informed decisions.

#### **ELECTION COVERAGE 2024**

KRCB FM 104.9 reaffirmed its dedication to civic engagement by producing over 30 election-related stories, including candidate interviews and comprehensive analyses of ballot initiatives. Collaborating with *The Press Democrat* and Sonoma State University, KRCB conducted a post- election online survey that engaged nearly 3,000 North Bay residents. This survey delved into voting choices for the presidential race, Measure J in Sonoma County, and Measure U in Napa County, uncovering not just how individuals voted, but the motivations behind their decisions. Developed by graduate students, the survey captured diverse local perspectives, fostering informed discussions and stories that resonate within our community.

#### **COMMUNITY NEWS PODCASTING**

KRCB Sonoma County News is dedicated to fostering informed communities through podcast offerings. The *Sonoma First News* podcast provides essential local news each weekday morning, covering breaking news, county government, elections, environmental updates, and cultural happenings from Sonoma to Bodega Bay. Additionally, the *NorCal Ballot Box* podcast offers insights into ballot measures and interviews with candidates, equipping listeners to make informed voting decisions. KRCB's newsroom strives to illuminate

the issues that matter most to residents, ensuring they have the knowledge needed to actively participate in shaping their community's future.

#### **IMMIGRANT RIGHTS**

In the wake of the 2024 election, KRCB news reported on a series of educational presentations, "Know About Your Rights." These sessions aim to empower attendees by informing them about their rights when interacting with federal immigration officials. With hundreds participating, the program covers essential scenarios and legal rights, providing practical advice and resources, such as a Red Card outlining rights related to the 4th and 5th Amendments. The presentations emphasize the importance of emergency preparedness and legal education amidst uncertainty. KRCB's newsroom is dedicated to conveying critical information to all members of the community, empowering attendees with essential knowledge about their rights.





#### **INDIE LENS POP-UP SERIES**

NorCal Public Media was selected to host community events with five *Independent Lens* documentary films. At a variety of locations in the community—libraries, theaters, community centers and more—we showed A Town Called Victoria, Razing Liberty Square, Breaking the News, Matter of Mind: My Parkinson's, and The Tuba Thieves. Audiences were brought together with housing advocates, NAACP thought leaders, news reporters and journalism educators and students, medical professionals, caregivers and boxing coaches for Parkinson's patients, and proud Muslim-Americans describing their rich cultural American stories. NorCal brings talented filmmakers and audiences together to reach a deeper understanding about fascinating and important topics.

#### **MUSIC FESTIVALS**

Summer is a favorite time of year at NorCal Public Media, because it means music festival season is here! With a strong music program on KRCB FM 104.9, we are invited every year to festivals all around the region and our music hosts, deeply connected with artists locally and nationally, often discover the musicians who fill these festivals with great sounds.

The NPR *Tiny Desk* Tour came to Petaluma and KRCB hosted the event; we proudly sponsored and hosted the stage for the Petaluma Music Festival, raising funds for music education; we sponsored a bluegrass concert in a redwood grove; and we grooved in our booth at the Railroad Square Music Festival to round out the summer fun.

#### **COMMUNITY VOICES INITIATIVE**

KRCB remains dedicated to strengthening community engagement by showcasing the rich diversity of voices and cultures within Sonoma County. Segments like *Postcards from Sonoma County* offer hyper-local narratives from smaller communities, granting them a valuable platform to share their insights and perspectives.



In 2024, KRCB 104.9 proudly spotlighted youth-focused organizations in the arts, including the Santa Rosa Symphony Youth Orchestra, Leland Street Farm Theatre, Poetry Out Loud, and Poetry in the Parks, through its *Arts Briefs* series. This effort not only showcases the talents of young artists but also cultivates a deeper appreciation for the arts throughout Sonoma County.

#### STUDENT VIDEO CONTEST

The Russian River Watershed Association's 2024 High School Video Contest showcased youth-created videos about Low Impact Development (LID) and its role in protecting the Russian River Watershed. Designed to raise awareness of water-related issues, the contest awarded scholarships to three winners. NorCal featured the winning videos on KRCB TV and KPJK TV, and across our digital platforms. 1st place: *Protect it with LID!*, explained how building and landscaping methods prevent pollutants from harming wildlife. 2nd place: *Put a LID on It!*, highlighted how LID protects habitats like those of the western pond turtle, a species threatened by pollution. 3rd place: *A Little Something About LID!*, addressed the role of water runoff.

#### **HOKULE'A VISITS THE BAY**

When the beloved traditional Hawaiian double-hulled voyaging canoe Hokule'a scheduled its first visit to the Bay Area since 1995, Bay Area Bountiful visited with Captain Mark Ellis of the Polynesian Voyaging Society to hear about the historic vessel's journey. On a "Voyage for the Earth," he said Hokule'a – Hawaiian for "Star of Gladness" – is circumnavigating the Pacific to visit other indigenous groups to ask them to share knowledge about adapting to climate change, so that all may benefit from their combined centuries of wisdom. "I hope Hokule'a brings that vision of hope and possibilities to everyone," said Captain Ellis.

## THE CENTER FOR ENVIRONMENTAL REPORTING

#### **CLIMATE CALIFORNIA**

Climate change demands new solutions - and new stories. NorCal Public Media proudly premiered the first two episodes of our new docuseries, *Climate California*, a poignant and provocative show that explores urgent and inspiring stories throughout the state. "I could leave and make it someone else's problem, or I can stay and fight. And I've chosen to fight," says Cesar Aguirre in the first episode, who protects his community in Kern County from oil leaks. NorCal also launched *Explorations*, an exciting 10-part digital series for youth, hosted by Meg Haywood-Sullivan, making subjects from redwoods activism to marine wildlife protection accessible to new audiences.

#### WHO OWNS THE WATER?

KRCB FM 104.9 partnered with *Bay City News* to produce a three-part series on California's Delta Conveyance Project, a proposed 45-mile tunnel transporting fresh water from the northern Delta to southern users. This critical extension of the State Water Project highlights political tensions among diverse stakeholders, including cities, farmers, tribes, and environmen-

talists, while addressing water rights and ecosystem impacts amid climate change. The series features insights from engineers on construction logistics and explores restoration efforts, examining how indigenous knowledge can enhance modern strategies. This





partnership effort highlights forward progress of the KRCB FM 104.9 educational commitment to critical water issues that impact California's sustainability.

#### **IMPORTANCE OF PARKS**

In partnership with Sonoma County Regional Parks, NorCal Public Media produced informational videos about various parks programs that benefit the community. The first video covers native plant restoration efforts taking place on the beaches of Doran Regional Park as well as on Hood Mountain. The second video explores the YES! Program, where youth are given the opportunity to get outdoors, connect with their natural environment, and explore Sonoma County's diverse ecosystems. The third video takes an educational look into the vital prescribed burns that are being conducted throughout various Regional Parks to reduce major wildfire risk and support the restoration of Indigenous cultural fire practices.

#### HOPE IN THE WATER

NorCal Public Media hosted a screening and discussion in November at the Cowell Theater at Fort Mason in San Francisco for the remarkable eco-series *Hope in the Water* which premiered on PBS this year. Partnering with Fed by Blue, whose mission is to teach us all about feeding our world from healthy oceans, and the International Ocean Film Foundation, we and hundreds of guests watched the national program and local videos, enjoyed wine and were fed sustainable-oceans foods from Hog Island Oysters and Pacific Catch West Coast Fish House. It was an evening of delicious ocean lessons and bounty.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL LISTENING**

KRCB FM 104.9 proudly partners with the community to produce programs encouraging environmental


awareness and engagement in local agriculture. Jack Hines, an environmental advocate and soundscape ecologist, presents the award-winning Ear to the Wild, immersing listeners in the natural sounds of the North Bay. Featuring recordings of wildlife, Ear to the Wild creates a calming sanctuary that encourages mindfulness and a bond to nature. Additionally, KRCB connects the community to agriculture through the Farm Tales series, featuring firsthand stories from Sonoma County farmers. This series highlights sustainable practices and innovations in agriculture, fostering a deeper understanding of local food systems. Savoring Sonoma complements this effort in a celebration of the bounty of Sonoma County, from winter greens to vibrant citrus. Hosted by James Beard Award-winner Clark Wolf.


